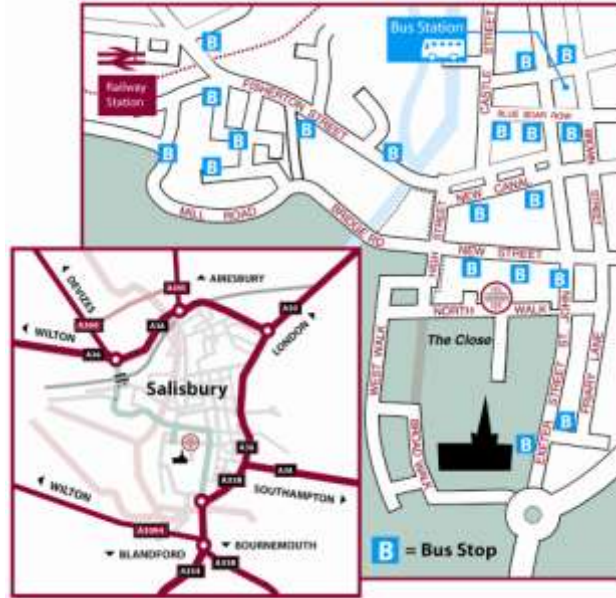
Sarum College has an equal opportunities policy and welcomes students and visitors with disabilities. Please discuss any special requirements with a member of our Hospitality staff.

Matthew's Sermon on the Mount has new delights to disclose every time one returns to it. Add to that his views on where wisdom may be found, how a fractured church can be a means of reconciliation, where women should be set within a religious community, what should be done (for better or worse) about the theological legacy of Paul ... and the menu for a biblical break on Matthew offers choice possibilities. Always lurking in the background is the business of defining his religion - is it Christianity, or is it Christian Judaism? In the end, we might ask on our own behalf, is our own calling to be Christians in the style of Matthew?

Genesis course code 2717
14 to 17 March 2011 with Michael DeLashmutt & Anne Claar Thomasson-Rosingh

More than any other book of the Bible, Genesis has sparked continued interest and continuous debate. This Biblical Study break will attempt to explore some of these issues and will help students to gain a renewed appreciation of the myths, histories, and messages alluded to by this sacred book. Throughout the course, we will explore together such key concerns as questions of historicity and authorship in the book, the reception of Genesis since Darwin, pastoral and practical problem associated with interpreting and teaching from Genesis today, and will explore how one reads Genesis in dialogue with other Abrahamic faiths.

Galatians and the Pastorals course code 2616
Mon 13 to Thur 16 June 2011

Galatians allows us to sit at the touchlines of the key **controversy of Paul's career, an episode which** undoubtedly shaped the theological position he seeks to justify in Romans. The Pastorals are very different: no specific controversy, so no argumentation, no appeal to particular scriptural texts and a general approach of such a different kind that both style and theology read as if from another author. How do all these epistles fit into the 'Pauline corpus'?

TUTORS

David Catchpole is a Scholar-in-Residence at Sarum College and Emeritus Professor of Theological Studies at the University of Exeter. His specialist interests centre on the New Testament, particularly the gospels and the quest of the historical Jesus.

Michael DeLashmutt is the Director of Studies at Sarum College. He is a member of the International Society for Religion Literature and Culture, the UK Research Network for Theology, Religion and Popular Culture, and the author of the SCM Core Text, *Theology and Popular Culture*. His research examines the relationship between the beliefs and practices of the Church and everyday life.

Anne Claar Thomasson-Rosingh is an academic tutor with the Southern Theological Education and Training Scheme (STETS). Her current academic interest is in the Old Testament. She has done research in Feminist Theology and the church father Basil of Caesarea (fourth century).

Frances Young is a Fellow of the British Academy and an Honorary Fellow of Sarum College. Her research interests have focused on the early Church Fathers and the New Testament.
