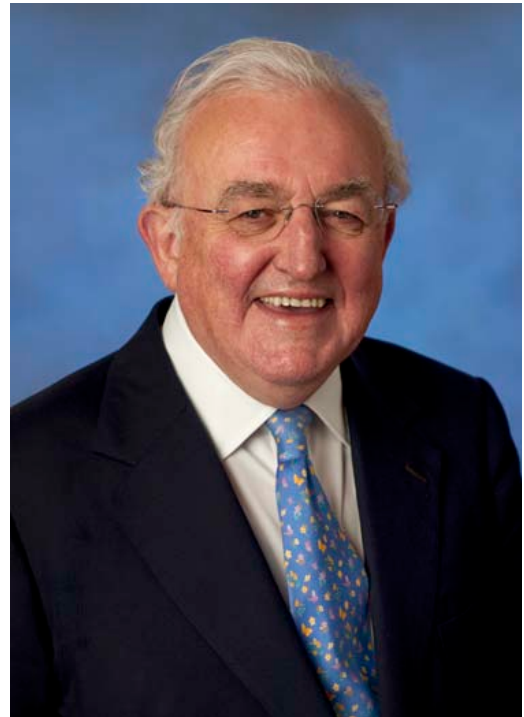

Lord Griffiths taught at the London School of Economics from 1965 to 1976. He was appointed professor of Banking and International Finance at the City University in 1976 and was dean of the City University Business School from 1982 to 1985. Lord Griffiths was a director of the Bank of England from 1983 to 1985.

Lord Griffiths served at No. 10 Downing Street as head of the Prime Minister's Policy Unit from 1985 to 1990. As special advisor to Margaret Thatcher, he was responsible for domestic policy-making and was a chief architect of the government's privatisation and deregulation programmes.

Since then, Lord Griffiths has been an international advisor to Goldman Sachs International concerned with strategic issues relating to private equity and United Kingdom and Asian operations, business development activities worldwide. He is chairman of the Europe, Middle East and Africa Audit, Business Practice and Compliance Committee.

He is a non-executive director of Times Newspaper Holdings Ltd. and Herman Miller Inc., and has served on the boards of ServiceMaster, English, Welsh and Scottish Railway, Land Securities Trillium and Westminster Health Care.



He has also been chairman of the School Examination and Assessment Council and the Centre for Policy Studies. He has been a member of various Select Committees in the House of Lords including the Select Committee on Economic Affairs.

Lord Griffiths is a trustee of the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lambeth Fund and chairman of Christian Responsibility in Public Affairs. He has written and lectured extensively on economic issues and the relationship of the Christian faith to politics and business, and has published various books on monetary policy and Christian ethics.

Born in Fforestfach, Swansea in 1941, Lord Griffiths was educated at Dynevor Grammar School and the London School of Economics.
